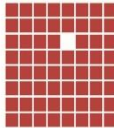

RE: **SUPPORT** – Senate Bill 1060 – *Heroin and Opioid Education and Community Action Act of 2017*
(*Start Talking Maryland Act*)

The Maryland State Medical Society, the Maryland Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians, the Mid-Atlantic Association of Community Health Centers, and the Maryland Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics submit this letter of **support** for Senate Bill 1060.

Senate Bill 1060 recognizes the critical importance of expanding public outreach, education, and intervention as a component of the State's response to the increasing incidences of substance misuse, addiction, and overdose. The legislation appropriately identifies drug courts, public schools, and institutions of higher education as essential components of a comprehensive strategy to increase public awareness of the growing epidemic. Senate Bill 1060 also seeks to ensure those institutions have access to adequate resources to develop appropriate education and outreach programs to achieve the objectives of the legislation.

In addition to the expansion of programs to enhance public awareness and the education of our children on drug addiction and prevention, Senate Bill 1060 also recognizes the importance of ensuring that schools and institutions of higher education are equipped and authorized to respond to overdose incidences by training and authorizing school nurses and campus police to administer naloxone or other overdose reversing medication and for schools and institutions of higher education to stock those medications so that they will be equipped to respond to an overdose.

While the named organizations cannot speak to the level of funding required to achieve the objectives of Senate Bill 1060, the framework for enhanced public outreach and education reflected in the legislation reflects critical components of a comprehensive effort to enhance public awareness and prevention. A favorable report is requested.
