## INTRODUCED BY: MedChi Public Health Committee MedChi Student Section Baltimore City Medical Society

SUBJECT: Transparency by Physician Reviewers for Insurance Formularies

Whereas, an Arizona physician serving on a state committee that decides which drugs should be preferred for Medicaid patients, accepted more than \$700,000 in perks and payments from drug makers over four and a half years<sup>1</sup>; and

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5 Whereas, the Governor of Arizona recently created new transparency rules for said state 6 committee, including mandatory conflict of interest training, public posting of disclosure forms, 7 required recusal for members with a conflict of interest, required disclosures for any individual 8 providing testimony, and required review of publicly available data on payments by 9 pharmaceutical and medical device companies to physicians<sup>2</sup>; and

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Whereas, physicians who serve on review boards of insurance company formularies have an obligation to serve those beneficiaries, and are therefore under obligation to be transparent about any perceived or real conflicts of interest that arise prior to or during that board service; and therefore be it

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Resolved, that MedChi ask our AMA to encourage states to require physicians who serve on formulary review boards to disclose conflicts of interest; and be it further

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19 Resolved, that MedChi ask our AMA to encourage insurance companies to require physicians who

- 20 serve on formulary review boards to disclose conflicts of interest.
