Medicaid Is Under Threat. You Can Help Protect It — One Text at a Time.

BALTIMORE, MD – May 15, 2025 – In a powerful show of unity, all fifty state medical societies including MedChi, The Maryland State Medical Society, signed on to a letter urging the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate to protect Medicaid from an \$880 billion spending reduction proposed by the House Energy and Commerce Committee. This proposed reduction is a serious threat to Maryland’s health care system.

More than 1.6 million Marylanders depend on Medicaid, and these cuts would hit our most vulnerable Marylanders the hardest: children, seniors, and people with disabilities. Physicians and health systems could be forced to scale back services, decrease their Medicaid patient caseload, or stop accepting Medicaid entirely. The result: reduced access to care for our most underserved communities. Maryland’s physicians cannot stand by while essential health care is put at risk.

To tackle this issue, a texting campaign has been set up by all the State Medical Societies to mobilize physicians to send pre-written texts through RumbleUp — a secure and compliant SMS texting platform — to encourage voters in key congressional districts to contact their legislators to oppose Medicaid cuts.
