## Resolution 22-14

INTRODUCED BY:	Baltimore City Medical Society
SUBJECT:	Prohibiting Non-Compete Clauses in Physician Employment Contracts
Whereas, our American Medical Association (AMA) in a 2013 study found that nearly 42% of physicians are employees; and	
Whereas, recognizing the growing number of physician employees in Maryland, MedChi, The Maryland State Medical Society, established the Center for the Employed Physician to provide resources and advocacy for physicians who choose to become employees of hospitals, group practices and other health care entities; and	
Whereas, of all the resources, the employment contract and its complexities have elicited significant concern from physicians, particularly non-compete clauses therein; and	
Whereas, our AMA and MedChi agree that "covenants-not to-compete restrict competition, disrupt continuity of care, and potentially deprive the public of medical services." ( <i>Opinion 9.02 and PEC 04/99, respectively</i> ); and	
Whereas, MedChi advocates for the profession of medicine and the physician-patient relationship; and	
Whereas, non-compete clauses may be unethical and compromise the professional rights of the physician; and	
Whereas, non-compete clauses shift the relationship from physician-patient to employing entity-patient, thereby jeopardizing the physician-patient relationship; therefore be it	
Resolved, that MedChi, The Maryland State Medical Society support legislation in the Maryland General Assembly to prohibit non-compete clauses in physician contracts.
