SUBJECT:	Support for AMA Ethical Policy on Physician-Assisted Suicide
Whereas, since its adoption at the founding meeting of the American Medical Association in 1847, our AMA Code of Medical Ethics has articulated the values to which physicians commit themselves as members of the medical profession; and	
Whereas, our AMA Code of Ethics is rooted in an understanding of the goals of medicine as a profession that dates back to the 5th century B.C. and the Greek physician Hippocrates: to relieve suffering and promote well-being in a relationship of fidelity with the patient; and	
Whereas, the American Medical Association, the American College of Physicians, the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, and the World Medical Association all oppose the practice of physician-assisted suicide; and	
Whereas, our AMA Code of Ethics since 1993 has stated that "Physician-assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would pose serious societal risks;" and	
Whereas, our AMA's Council of Ethical and Judicial Affairs (CEJA) in 2016 initiated a thorough and comprehensive review of PAS, soliciting information and opinions from a wide variety of stakeholders on the issue, and concluded in its report of 2018 that no substantive change in its ethical policy was warranted; and	
Whereas, the 2018 CEJA report on PAS was extensively reviewed and vigorously debated at 3 separate AMA House of Delegates meetings in 2018 and 2019 before being adopted by a strong margin of >70% of Delegates; therefore be it	
Resolved, that MedChi supports our AMA's current position statement on physician-assisted suicide codified in Opinion E-5.7 and Opinion 1.1.7 of our AMA Code of Ethics.
